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
Organize a Youth Climate Summit

Examples of Student-driven Climate Action Projects


School Projects

- Carbon and energy audit of school campus
- Replaced all the school lights with LED
- Organized school events: Earth Day, "green" dances, sustainability weeks, and speaker series
- Build a school garden & grow food for your school
- Reduce Plastic Waste
- Install Solar Panels on the school

Community Projects

- Create a community pollinator garden
- Build a nature trail and outdoor classroom
- Organize a beach or park clean-up event
- Host a climate-themed movie night
- Do a biodiversity inventory
- Organize a bike-share program
- Volunteer with local farms and support local & organic food
- Host a 'Trashion Show'
